This picture reminds us to be mindful when buying online this holiday season and to always look closely at the details. Especially when buying coins.

2025 LIBRARY IMPROVEMENT AND ANA SUMMER SEMINAR GRANTS

LAST CHANCE TO SEND IN YOUR ENTRY FORMS!

As has been the case for the last several years, the drawings will coincide with the Houston Money Show on January 17TH or 18TH in 2025.

Each year, the TNA issues Grants to two qualifying members for tuition, room and board, and travel to the ANA Summer Seminar. TNA also funds five \$125 reimbursement Grants to qualifying members to purchase books and material to improve your numismatic libraries.

SUMMER SEMINAR: Individuals (not clubs) who have been members for two years (and are non-winners for two years) are eligible to enter the drawing for one of two grants to cover transportation, room and board, and tuition at the 2025 ANA Summer Seminar in Colorado Springs.

LIBRARY: Individuals and clubs who have been members for two years (and are non-winners for two years) are eligible to enter the drawing for one of five grants of up to \$125 to improve the member's numismatic library.

Entries will be drawn first for the Summer Seminar, and then for the Library Improvement Grants. A member may only win one grant per year.

Reelection

If you are an incumbent Governor or Officer, you need to notify your intent to run for reelection with the TNA Secretary during the application window (Jan. 1 - April 16).

New Nominees

If you intend to run for a Governor or an Officer position, you need to notify the TNA Secretary during the application window (Jan. 1 - April 16). Please include your name and your desired position title. All nominees must be up-to-date on their membership dues and Governor nominees must live in the District. See details from the TNA bylaws on the following page for additional information.

Promote Your Campaign

You are encouraged to publish a statement giving your biography and promoting your campaign in the TNA News magazine for the December 2024 and March 2025 issues. Contact Ann Marie Avants at theTNAnews@gmail.com by October 1 to make it into the December issue. Reach out any time with questions!

Ballots

Ballots will be mailed to all TNA members for state-wide Officer positions or individual districts for Governor positions if two or more people are running for that position. Unopposed races will not be issued ballots. Ballots will be mailed by April 21 and must be returned by May 16, 2025. See the following page for more details.

TNA ELECTION PROCEDURES

The following election procedures are set forth by the TNA Bylaws and the TNA Board. The 2025 election is for Officers and Governors to serve for the two-year period beginning after the end of the 2025 TNA Convention and through the end of the 2027 TNA Convention. The election is by secret ballot.

The five statewide Officers are the President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. In addition, District Governors are up for election. To run for office, a candidate needs to file for office in writing or electronically directly with the TNA Secretary from January 1, 2025 until April 16, 2025. Section 5.02a of the TNA bylaws: Candidates for office may file for office with the Association's Secretary from the period of one hundred fifty (150) days to forty-five (45) days before the date of the Annual Meeting. A nomination by another member will not be accepted. All candidates for statewide offices must be Texas residents. All candidates for District Governor must reside in the district they are running for with the exception of District 10 where New Mexico residents within 75 miles of the district border are eligible.

All candidates must be members of the TNA at the time they file for office. See Section 2.02 of the TNA bylaws. No member shall be eligible for President until they have served in at least one elected office in the TNA. No President or Vice-President shall serve more than two consecutive terms or partial terms in the same office without a break in service. If a candidate runs for President or Secretary, they cannot run for any other office. Otherwise, candidates can run for multiple offices if the resident restrictions allow.

State Officers are elected by all TNA members. District Governors are elected by TNA members in the respective districts. There is no provision for write-in votes. There is no run-off in the event a candidate does not receive at least fifty-one percent of the votes. The candidate receiving the most votes shall be declared the winner of the election. In the event candidates receive the same number of votes, the winner will be determined by the outgoing Board of Directors.

Ballots shall only be sent to TNA members where there are contested elections. If there is only one candidate for an office, the office shall be deemed uncontested and the Board shall certify that candidate as elected to the office. Ballots will be mailed to TNA members by April 21, 2025 and must be received (not post-marked) by the Secretary by May 16, 2025. Section 5.03c: The Secretary shall be authorized to mail official ballots to members forty (40) days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting. Ballots must be returned and in the Secretary's office fifteen (15) days before the date of the Annual Meeting. Late ballots, altered ballots or ballots suspected of being altered or otherwise tampered with will not be counted.

The results of the election will be announced at the 2025 Annual Meeting of the membership in Arlington, Texas. Section 5.03d: The President shall appoint an Election Committee at least twenty-one (21) days before the date of the Annual Meeting to judge and count the ballots. The Committee shall consist of the Secretary and two (2) other Board Members; however, no Election Committee Member shall be involved in a contested election.

Candidates may submit a biographical sketch, no longer than 150 words, suitable for publication in the TNA News and TNA website. If publishing deadlines allow, candidates names and any biography will be published in the TNA News. The same may be posted on the TNA website. Candidates may purchase appropriate political advertising in the TNA News.

Section 2.02 of the TNA Bylaws provide: A Membership shall be open to all who fulfill the requirements contained herein. An applicant's name shall be published in the official publication of the Association. If no written objections are received by the Secretary by the first day of the next month following publication, the applicant shall be admitted to membership.

Tyler's very active coin club opened the doors Friday with nearly 100 tables occupied in the very spacious facility. Attendees were waiting for the 9AM opening and began filing in. The attendance figures of 650 on Friday and more than 1000 on Saturday saw someone at every dealer's table all day. With wide aisles and spacious work areas, the facility made finding that special or needed item very easy.

The Tyler Coin Clubs' active members (over 80 dues paying members) were on hand to make this show a success – from working registration,

setting up and taking down, assisting dealers unload and load, hourly door prizes.

Scouting Merit Badge – the club has a scouting representative who is a certified coin collecting merit badge counselor. He met with scouts on Saturday and several fulfilled the requirements for the merit badge.

Food Truck – Eljalisciense food truck provided a number of choices of very good tacos, etc. for those at the show.

Raffle – Raffle tickets were sold at the registration table. A ¼ ounce gold coin graded MS-67 and a Carson City Morgan Dollar graded MS-63 was the main attraction. Many other items were also included. The winning ticket was drawn at the end of the show and Tony, from Gun Barrel City, was the winner.

NORTH STAR OF TEXAS COIN CLUB OF PARIS

PARIS NATIONAL BANK NOTES

The North Star of Texas Coin Club of Paris recently joined forces with the Paris Public Library to highlight the Historical Paris Downtown Square and the devastating Paris Fire of March 21, 1916, (that destroyed the Downtown Square and over half of the town) with a display of Paris National Bank Notes and of Paris Bank History. The fire destroyed 4 of the 5 existing Paris banks. Fire brigades from surrounding communities and as far away as Dallas congregated in Paris to help fight the fire and save the town. The only bank building to survive the fire was the First National Bank of Paris building. The multi-storied brick building had only been completed just 3 months prior to the fire and miraculously escaped most of the devastation surrounding it.

The coin club display included pictures of the bank buildings before the fire and the former bank buildings as they exist today after being rebuilt in 1917. National Bank Notes on display included examples of both large and small bills issued by the First National Bank of Paris, City National Bank of Paris and American National Bank of Paris. The two other banks on the square were the First State Bank of Paris and the Lamar Bank and Trust of Paris. The Paris National Bank Notes and Paris Bank History will be on display at the Paris Public Library thru the end of October.

Participate & Enrich Your Numismatic Hobby

Preparations for the 2025 Educational Exhibits have already begun and participating in the exhibits is the perfect way to enrich your numismatic hobby! If you are not familiar with the term "educational exhibits", an exhibit is a display of numismatic items and the story behind them. In other words - a Numismatic Show and Tell. The benefits of exhibiting are many: Increasing your numismatic knowledge, sharing your knowledge and research with others, friendship with other exhibitors, competing for prizes and recognition, and feeling a sense of pride and satisfaction when your project is on display.

The TNA Exhibit Classifications are: 1) US Coins, 2) US Paper Money, 3) World Coins, 4) World Paper Money, 5) Medals/Tokens, 6) Miscellaneous, and 7) One Case. An exhibit can be from 1 to 10 cases, depending on your subject and what you intend to show. Lockable cases are provided by TNA, and Rules, Application and Judges' Score Sheet are available on the TNA website: TNA.org. Awards and/or Recognition will be presented to all exhibitors. There is also a special award presented to a New Exhibitor - Best exhibit by a person who has never before exhibited competitively.

If this is your very first exhibit, you might want to keep it small, perhaps 1-3 cases. Although the One Case Exhibit is ideal for a beginner, it is also the most competitive class. Exhibitors may enter two exhibits as long as they are in different classes. Many experienced numismatists enter an exhibit in one of the first six classes and then enter their second exhibit in the One Case Classification.


Judging of the exhibits will be based on criteria which is standard with numismatic exhibiting.

The numismatic specifications of the exhibited items should be described to the extent needed by the exhibit's scope to answer the questions of another numismatist. Additional information should be given to answer the questions of a general viewer. Exhibits will also be judged for inspiration, education, creativity, attractiveness, balance, completeness and dedication to collecting. TNA GOVERNOR HONORED AT THE INTERNATIONAL LATINO BOOK AWARDS FOR NUMISMATICS OF THE BORDERLAND



The borderland region of El Paso, TX, and Juarez, Mexico has a new reason to celebrate! Local El Paso numismatist (and author) Jason Alan Elwell received an Honorable Mention for his book *Numismatics of the Borderland: The El Paso / Juarez & Las Cruces Region, 1st Edition* in the category of **Best Reference Book 2024**. This award was given by the International Latino Book Awards, the largest award in the USA celebrating achievements in Latino literature. The (ILBA) is hosted by Empowering Latino Futures, a Non-Profit 501(c)3 out of Los Angeles, CA. For the 2024 book competition, the (ILBA) had 239 judges review 6,000 books totaling 235,000 pages of literature. As each author and book competed for their respective category, only a fraction of submissions were selected to receive an award. The 2024 (ILBA) award ceremony was held on October 19, 2024, at the Los Angeles City College located in East Hollywood. At the ceremony, Jason Elwell accepted his Honorable Mention and could be seen sharing his thoughts about what makes borderland numismatics so special.

In writing this book, the author felt that numismatic literature was missing the connectivity that makes borderland numismatics so interesting. As the El Paso region borders 3 states (Texas, New Mexico, and Chihuahua) and 2 countries (United States and Mexico), it can be a challenge to research an item from this area. Most numismatic reference material tends to split up this region through standard cataloging efforts. By thinking outside the box and cataloging borderland numismatics (medals, tokens, wood nickels, casino chips, and more) alongside maps, historical photos, and documents within one book, it is hopeful that the reader will have a better understanding and appreciation for borderland culture and the numismatic items that have stood the test of time.

Numismatics of the Borderland: The El Paso / Juarez & Las Cruces Region 1st Edition features the most comprehensive catalog of borderland numismatics covering medals, tokens, casino chips, coins, scrip, and more! It showcases unknown and unlisted discoveries and actual size examples in high resolution and full color. This book is packed with specifications, descriptions, and over 950 images within its 218-page hardback format! While the meat and potatoes of this 1st edition are about El Paso, several items easily cross reference into Juarez and Las Cruces. This book was locally written and self-published by El Paso numismatist Jason Alan Elwell. Keep an eye out as this book is up for another literary award! 1808/7 U.S. HALF CENT – RARE DIE STATE

I purchased this interesting coin recently on eBay. The coin caught my attention because of the obverse cud over the TY in the word Liberty. I have collected half cents for over 40 years, and I have owned several of this date and variety, but I had never actually seen one with this die state displaying the cud. The 1808/7 Half Cent (C-2) is a fairly scarce coin in its own right. It is classified as a high R-2 or low R-3 with less than 700 examples known. Current estimates are that less than 30 exist of this die state displaying the cud over the TY. Late in the life of the die used to produce this coin, a die crack formed over RTY and eventually over BERTY. Shortly afterward, the full cud broke out over the TY as displayed on my example.

I have enjoyed collecting half cents over the years because they are very reasonably priced as compared to their rarity. Few people collect them by date and even less by die state, so I was able to snare this coin at a very good price. Happy hunting!

VIEWING THE ROWE-BARR COLLECTION OF TEXAS CURRENCY Mario Ward, Vice President of the Gateway Coin Club, Inc. of San Antonio, TX

While visiting the Dallas-Fort Worth area recently, I reviewed information regarding the Degolyer Library at SMU, named after Everette L. Degolyer, Sr. I heard that it held a fantastic collection of rare books, manuscripts, maps, and periodicals dealing with western Americana, business history, railroad and transportation history, and other important special collections and records. For me, the star of the collection was the Rowe-Barr Collection of Texas Currency, containing 2,628 records which can be sorted by county of origin, decade, denomination, currency type, and rarity. John Nelson Rowe III and B.B. Barr were brothers-inlaw, business partners, and collectors of currency used in Texas from its independence through the Great Depression.

Their collections included notes, scripts, bonds, and other types of currencies from historical Texas eras including: Republic of Texas, 1836-1845; Early Statehood 1845-186; Confederacy 1861-1865; National Bank Era 1863-1913.

Mr. Rowe, in addition to collecting Texas history papers, focused his collections of Texas currency through the Civil War. He was a wellrespected professional numismatist who amassed one of the greatest collections of coins and currency ever known. He also earned the lifetime achievement award from the Professional Numismatic Guild. Mr. Barr, meanwhile, targeted his collection on notes and currency during the post-Civil War period. These men gave their collections to SMU in 2003 so they could be preserved and available for the enjoyment of future generations.

The currency notes are unique and help us appreciate the engraving and printing of the currency in the collection. The images associated with the notes, such as bison, railroads, cotton bolls, ships, and Native Americans, etc. tell us about the aspirations and ideals of people in Texas during these historical periods.

SINGAPORE MINT'S 30TH ANNIVERSARY COIN

The world's first tripartite coin set comprising three fan-shaped coins issued simultaneously by three countries - Cook Islands, Fiji, and Samoa - was uniquely created to mark Singapore Mint's 30th Anniversary.

Highlighted on each of these coins are the respective famous cultural activities, icons, and landmarks of the three countries. All the three coins are legal tender, and the reverse of each coin bears the emblems of their respective countries along with the year-date 1998. Each coin has a face value of \$2, composed of .925 silver in proof finish. The coin's total weight is 5 ounces.

Delicately surrounded by these three coins is a specially designed Singapore Mint's 30th anniversary silver proof commemorative medallion. Previous designs of the three countries' awardwinning coins are meaningfully featured on the reverse of the medallion.

This was a unique creation by the Singapore Mint which captures its hard-earned prestige gained through its 30 years of progress. With this issue, The Singapore Mint continues to maintain its position as one of the world's leading mints and manufacturer of commemorative coins, medallions, medals and other collectibles.

2015 GERMAN 2 EURO COIN COMMEMORATING THE 25TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE REUNIFICATION OF GERMANY

The Berlin Wall that separated East Berlin, the Soviet Sector, from West Berlin the British. French and the US zones, was built August 13, 1961. Due to pressure from protests for reforms throughout East Germany in 1989, the Berlin Wall was opened November 9, 1989. During a press conference on the evening of November 9, 1989, an East German Spokesperson was asked when travel restrictions to the East would ease. The Spokesperson could be visibly seen as confused and uttered just one word that changed World history: "immediately!" As soon as word got out crowds began to swell at border check points in East Berlin. As the East German Border Guards were overwhelmed and no orders from higher ups had come in to stop the crowds, the East German citizens flooded West Berlin!

A Unification Treaty was signed by East and West Germany on Aug. 31, 1990. The 2+4 Agreement between the foreign ministers of East and West Germany, the US, Great Britain, France and the Soviet Union was signed in Moscow. East Germany officially joined West Germany on October 3, 1990. The East German government voted itself out of existence, the only time in world history that a

sovereign nation has done this! The Reunification led to the election of West German Helmut Kohl as the first democratically chosen Chancellor of a united Germany since 1932.

There have been problems with a unified Germany. As the East German economy was centrally planned and significantly less productive than West Germany, state owned industries went out of business and were sold off to the highest bidder. Massive unemployment became rampant in the former East. Though over a trillion dollars over thirty-plus years was spent on modernizing the eastern states, wages and job opportunities are still much lower compared to the western parts of the country.

Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev visited East Berlin for the 40th anniversary of East Germany on October 07, 1989. Gorbachev advised the then dictator of East Germany Erich Honecker that the Soviet Union would not back any repression of the protesting East Germans. East Berliners chanted "Gorbachev... Gorbachev!" wanting Soviet style reforms for their country, while Honecker could just look on.

The Berlin Wall was celebrated by the East

German regime calling it the "Anti-Fascist Rampart." The wall was said to keep out "revenge seeking West Germans." The number of people who died trying to cross the Berlin Wall between 1961 and 1989 is estimated to be at least 140.

The obverse of the coin depicts people in the foreground standing in front of the Brandenburg Gate, a symbol of the German Unification. To the left is 25 JAHRE DEUTSCHE EINHEIT 2015 "25 Years of German Unity 2015." To the right is the slogan WIR SIND EIN VOLK "We are one people" repeated three times. The reverse depicts the map of the European Union with the value of 2 EURO superimposed. The coin is composed of two alloys. The inner circle is copper-brass. The outer ring is coppernickel. Face value is approximately \$2.19.





CIVIL WAR CENTENNIAL MEDAL 1961-1965

The Civil War Centennial Commission was created by the United States Congress in 1957 to assist in the fiveyear observance of the 100th anniversary of the American Civil War. The Commission decided early in their discussions that a commemorative medal should be struck and bear the portraits of the two great Civil War leaders, Generals Grant and Lee.



Obverse Description: "LET US HAVE PEACE," " CONSCIOUSNESS OF DUTY FAITHFULLY PERFORMED," two busts in center, Ulysses S. Grant on left facing 3/4 right, Robert E. Lee on right facing 3/4 left, and "ULYSSES S. GRANT" / "ROBERT E. LEE" below each respective bust

The reverse design includes the official seal of the Civil War Centennial Commission. The text around the obverse of the medals is significant. The quotation, Let's Have Peace," is taken from a letter written by General Grant in May of 1868 in which he accepted the Republican nomination for President of the United States. The quotation of General Lee's, "Consciousness of Duty Faithfully Performed," is from the General Orders #9, Headquarters, Army of Northern Virginia, April 16, 1865, which was General Lee's farewell message to his troops.

The 63.5 mm bronze medal was designed by United States sculptor Joseph Emile Renier and struck by the Medallic Art Company in New York City.

WEB PRESS NOTES Robert Wise, Gateway Coin Club, Inc. of San Antonio, Texas

Often non-collectors ask what they can look for when looking at currency to collect. I try to tell things that are on currency that is still in circulation. I, of course, tell them to look for "star * notes" and possible "web press notes."

Most collectors have heard of the web press notes and most can identify a web press note. However, fewer understand the purpose and reason for the notes. These are years where varieties can be found in series 1988A, series 1993, and series 1995 on one-dollar bills only. These are not considered error notes but are experimental notes.

Traditional one-dollar notes are printed in a three-step process on pre-cut sheets with thirty-two notes on each sheet. The U.S. Bureau of Engraving and Printing, BEP, was experimenting with a faster printing process which involved printing both sides of the bills in one pass using continuous rolls of paper as opposed to individual sheets. After this experimentation, the BEP realized the quality of the bills was lacking and several unforeseen printing problems occurred causing this process to be discontinued.

To identify a web press note, examine the obverse of the bill and look for the very small plate number to the right of the U.S. Treasury Department Seal. On the reverse of the bill look for the very small plate number above the "E" in the word "ONE."

Depending of course on the condition of the bill, most web press bills sell for about seven dollars to twenty dollars. That's not a bad profit for a single dollar.



THE AMERICAN LEGION SCHOOL AWARD MEDAL Joe Vincent, North Star of Texas Coin Club

TNA Show & Tell

I found this medal in a junk drawer at my grandparents' house over 50 years ago and recently rediscovered it. I wondered who in my family might have won this award and what the award represented. So, I did some internet researching.

The American Legion School Award began in Pennsylvania in 1922 for 8th grade boys who demonstrated the following characteristics: courage, scholarship, service, honor and leadership. Girls were added in 1925 and were awarded for demonstrating the following: courage, scholarship, service, character and companionship. Students from graduating classes of elementary, junior high school, senior high school and college were eligible. Recipients were voted on by the graduating class and faculty and then submitted to their local American Legion post where the final selection was made. Since 1926 the award has been given nationwide with a goal to instill character and Americanism ideals in young people.

This medal was made by the Metallic Art Company of New York in bronze. This particular medal is 2 1/2 inches in diameter. On the obverse is the slogan "FOR GOD AND COUNTRY" and the motto "SEMPER FIDELIS" (Always faithful) inscribed below. The obverse displays a WWII military image of a soldier, sailor and airman in the forefront with troops, fully geared, at the ready in the background. The reverse displays the words; Courage, Leadership, Honor, Service and Scholarship. The name, American Legion School Award, is over a radiant lamp of knowledge positioned atop an open book, feather pen and olive branch. The American Legion insignia is at the bottom. The sculptor is not listed but it is believed to have been Joseph E. Renier.

Since its inception, the American Legion School Award has morphed into several versions and categories and is still awarded today to thousands of recipients nationwide. The pictured medal is a 1950 version distributed in 1951 to high school seniors. This coincides perfectly with my aunt, who was an outstanding student and graduated from high school in 1951. Now I finally know the history of this medal that has been awarded to outstanding American students for more than 100 years.

MEDAL HONORING CHARLES A. LINDBERGH, "THE LONE EAGLE" Frank Galindo, President, Gateway Coin Club, Inc. of San Antonio

One of the most popular figures of the twentieth century was Charles A. Lindbergh, an early aviation pioneer who made history when he was the first pilot to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean. He designed and helped build his plane, the "Spirit of St. Louis," to compete for the \$25,000 Orteig Prize for the first flight between New York to Paris. Several of the world's most famous aviators accepted the challenge. Among them was French flying ace Rene Fonck, polar explorer Richard Byrd, and Charles Lindbergh.

Lindbergh's single-engine monoplane did not have a radio, gas gauge, parachute, or navigation equipment. He took off on this dangerous flight from Roosevelt Field on Long Island, New York enroute to Paris, France. Six aviators had died attempting this long and hazardous flight that he was about to take. Lindbergh was alone without a navigator or co-pilot.

In May 1927, he successfully flew his plane, the "Spirit of St. Louis," from

New York to Paris. He landed at Le Bourget Aerodrome, Paris, France at 10:22 p.m. and was greeted by a cheering crowd of thousands. He was Nicknamed "Lucky Lindy" and "The Lone Eagle" because of his incredible flight.

The feat made him an instant international celebrity since he was the first aviator to complete a solo transatlantic flight. Lindbergh flew 3,600 miles in 33 hours, 30 minutes, 29.8 seconds. He had not slept in 55 hours. Lindbergh returned to the United States and was welcomed as a hero and is one of the best-known figures in aeronautical history.

Soon after his historic flight, many diverse types of souvenirs were offered to the public. These include toys, first day covers, tapestries, tokens, medals, stamps, books, lunch boxes, pinbacks, cigar labels, coin banks, pocket watches, Lindbergh dolls, and many other souvenir items. Shown in the photo is a medal depicting Lindbergh that was issued to commemorate his historic flight.

The obverse shows a bust of Lindbergh wearing a leather flight helmet and facing to the right.

The text reads "LINDBERGH," "MEDAL OF THE CONGRESS," "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA" and in very small lettering, "ACT MAY 4, 1928 LAURA FRASER SCULPTOR."

The reverse depicts the sun over the horizon with its rays rising to the stars, and an image of a lone eagle with wings spread in flight through day and night. The medal's diameter is 69 mm and was struck in bronze.

The notable artist and sculptor, Laura Gardin Fraser, sculpted the medal. She was also the first woman to design an American coin (the Alabama Centennial Half Dollar in 1921).





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2019 CHINESE SILVER PANDA Ellie Tate, (YN) Dallas Coin Club

I am excited to share all about this series of beautiful Chinese bullion coins with giant pandas on them. I will be telling you about the coin that I have as well as others, so you will learn a lot. And this might even convince you to go out and buy your very own Chinese coin collection, which would be my goal!

All the Chinese panda coins show giant pandas, but they are all different. My coin shows a mother giant panda holding its baby. This coin is made of .999 pure silver and weighs 30 grams. It has a diameter of 40 mm and a thickness of 2.98 mm. It is a bullion coin, which are coins that are made of precious metals and are not for circulation. It was minted at the Shenzhen Mint.

The first Chinese panda coins were issued in approximately 1982, initially in gold. Then in 1983 the first silver giant panda coin was minted. The China mint struck 10,000 of that type, and that escalated to 10,000,000 at the present time. The coin that I have has the mintage of 10,000,000 as well. Given that the population of China is more than 1 billion, that is not such a large mintage. 1989 was the first year a brilliant uncirculated mint state, not proof, silver panda coin was issued.

The most popular coin is the oneounce silver giant panda coin. A good amount of people all around the world would very much like to have these beautiful coins. The coins are always limited edition, making them desirable. Among the Chinese mints that produce these coins are the Shenyang mint, the Shanghai mint, and the Shenzhen mint. The denominations the coins have been issued in are 3 Yuan, 5 Yuan, 10 Yuan, 50 Yuan, 100 Yuan, 200 Yuan, and 300 Yuan.

Each year except 2002, every coin has had its own unique giant panda design, always with different poses and locations. It makes collecting the coins more enjoyable, and encourages people to buy them every year. There are different varieties of the pandas shown as well. The coin that I have shows the Temple of Heaven in Beijing on the obverse, which is a religious complex completed in 1420 during the Ming dynasty.

Gold and silver are the most common versions of these coins, but they have also been made in platinum and palladium. Minted with care, these coins show people the beauty of China. Gold coins of this series feature the giant panda on the reverse, while the silver version displays the giant panda on the obverse.

The giant panda holds a special place in Chinese culture. It symbolizes peace, harmony, and friendship. The coin also represents China's precious metals. These panda coins are so fun to look at! And to conclude I definitely recommend you go out and start to collect these very wonderful coins!

1) Is this piece a U.S. commemorative coin?

The illustrated piece is not a U.S. commemorative coin. It is an awards medal issued for the 1892-93 Columbian Exposition in Chicago. It was struck at the U.S. Mint using designs prepared by Augustus St. Gaudens (obverse) and Charles Barber (reverse). These come in large (about 3 inch) and small (about 1.25 inch) sizes in bronze. The official cases on the large ones were stamped aluminum with blue inserts.

2) Why are 1851-1853 three cent pieces made of .750 silver instead of coin silver (.900 fine)?

The 1851 to 1853 issues of the three cent piece (also called a trime) were made from .750 fine silver instead of the usual .900 fine silver to deliberately lower the intrinsic value of the pieces. This was in an effort to keep them in circulation rather than have them hoarded, exported, or melted as happened from time to time with the larger denominations in .900 fine silver. The composition reverted to the traditional .900 fine in 1855 and the trimes continued to be issued through 1873.

3) What is a "Black Beauty" Jefferson Nickel?

The "Black Beauty" Jefferson nickels of 1958-59 are an unusual issue of the Philadelphia Mint in which the blanks were improperly annealed before striking, causing them to take on a dark toning before they were released for circulation. By far the majority of the 1958-59 issue had ordinary bright surfaces at the time of issue.



4) What is the first federally-authorized U.S. copper coin?

The earliest federally-authorized copper coin is the Fugio Cent* of 1787. These were privately struck by James Jarvis and his Company for Coining Coppers. The total production, while substantial, was only a small part of what was ordered and anticipated. Some of the copper was diverted to production of more profitable (lighter) private and state issues by Jarvis and his associates. Fugio Cents in high grade are available to collectors today from the Bank of New York hoard. They are a foundation coin for a U.S. type set.

* These were previously called Fugio Coppers, but this term was updated when records were unearthed from the meetings of the Continental Congress (under the Articles of Confederation) which call out the mandated weights of these coins and call them "Cents" (and name them as 100 for a dollar).

5) When did the United Kingdom transition to a nonsilver circulating coinage?

The United Kingdom transitioned to a nonsilver circulating coinage in two major stages. Their pre-1920 3 pence, 6 pence, shillings, florins, half crowns and crowns were all .925 or "sterling" silver. In response to adopting the gold standard and recognizing the financial cost of World War I, the lower denominations were reduced to .500 fine from 1921-1947. World War II brought copper-nickel coinage to the former reduced-silver denominations. All the post-1970 coinage (except issues for collectors) has been base metal.

6) Why isn't there 1.0 ounce of pure silver in a vintage silver dollar?

The metallic content and weight of the U.S. silver dollar goes back to the original Congressional act of April, 1792

authorizing creation of the mint and listing the denominations to be struck. The Congress sought to create a silver dollar which would have nearly full intrinsic value and be competitive with the Spanish Colonial 8 Reales coin then in common circulation. At the then prevailing market prices of silver and gold, this meant a dollar of about 416 grains (about 0.8 ounce). Through several cycles of market fluctuation since 1792, the silver content of a dollar was not materially changed until 1965 with the removal of silver from circulating coinage. The bullion "coin", the American Silver Eagle since 1986, contains a full ounce, but it is not intended to be a circulating issue.



7) Why does silver dip cleaner damage the luster on coins?

The most popular buffered acid dips, including EZest and JewelLuster, remove silver sulfide toning very rapidly. Their use is sometimes appropriate (with adequate rinsing and drying without rubbing), but users must realize that some silver is removed from the coin's surfaces. The tops of the radial ridges (flow lines formed on striking) are rounded or removed. The result is a whiter surface, but with impaired luster as light is reflected differently from what it would be with original surfaces. The dipping damage is cumulative, if a given coin is repeatedly dipped. It is not advised to clean coins you intend to sell in the collector market or plan to submit for third party grading.

8) What is a "remainder" note in currency collecting?

A "remainder note" is an unissued, incomplete piece of currency. They are often lacking signatures and may come as complete or partial uncut sheets. The certified remainder note illustrated below was issued by the Commercial & Agricultural Bank of Texas. This bank printed fiscal papers and paper money, but few examples have survived and collecting complete notes can be challenging.





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READING AN 18TH CENTURY CURRENCY CONVERSION TABLE

Most of us like a mystery. This one involves a 28.25 gram coin weight marked £3:12S, Figure 1, and a Jonathan Dakin trade card¹, Figure 3, shown at a scale convention in May 2023. A coin collector friend asked: "What is this £3:12S weight and how was it used?" The denomination matches a line on the Dakin trade card. Dakin was a balance maker and blacksmith in colonial Boston until the mid-18th century. He had a side-line selling imported coin scales sent from England. He died in 1761 but his trade card continued in use by his successor.

The short answer is the weight was used to detect counterfeit or clipped gold coins in New England about 1750. See **Figure 4** for an example of metal clipped from English coins in the mid-1600s. The British did not produce a coin with a value of three pounds and 12 shillings (£3/12s). Coins with that value were produced by Portugal and Brazil. The Dakin card calls the £3/12s weight a Doub: Johannes and notes it should be

A Johannes was a coin minted under the authority of King Johannes V of Portugal (João V). A 12800 Reis gold coin sold in a recent auction. It weighed 28.68 grams, Figure 2. My friend's weight could be used to confirm the coin is of good weight. A longer answer follows...

DAKIN TRADE CARD

This Dakin trade card was placed in scale boxes to help businessmen check coins and balance their books. It gives the expected weight of 14 coins, 10 gold and 4 silver, from England, Portugal and her colonies and Spain and her colonies. Book values in British currency are listed for the coins, paper money and gold and silver bullion. Examples of the coins, paper money and coin weights are given on the following pages. Where coins are shown, the calculated coin weight is given in parentheses after the weight of the coin. All coins shown would have passed the weight test. Figure 3 – Jonathan Dakin's trade card gives the weight of gold and silver coins in Troy ounces (Oz = 31.1 grams), Penny Weight (dwt = 1.56 grams) and Grains (gra = 0.065 grams) where 24 gra = 1 dwt and 20 dwt = 1 Oz. The relative values of paper money (Old Tenor and Lawful Money) and gold and silver bullion are also given. Note that Dakin's name was blacked out for use by another vendor.

An act passed by the government of Massachusetts-Bay Province on March 31, 1750 had a table to convert coins and paper money in Boston into money of account expressed in English monetary units. The monetary units of Britain were the pound, shilling and pence where £1 equaled 20s and 1s equaled 12d. From 1690³ the Massachusetts colony issued paper money to pay expenses of the French Indian War. This scrip or Tenor was a check with a defined interest rate payable on a defined end date. The value of scrip dropped significantly with time. In 1750 the last paper money was issued as Lawful Money. In the Dakin card, 1s Lawful Money = 2.66s Old Tenor. Examples of paper currency issued by Massachusetts-Bay Colony are shown on the following pages (Old Tenor, New Tenor, New-New Tenor and Lawful Money).^{4, 5} Most of the coins that circulated in Massachusetts during colonial times were from Spain's colonies, Portugal's colonies or France. Few British coins circulated

in New England, but accounting was done in English currency. Colonies were expected to send money and raw materials to England. Several countries retariffed their money about this time: Spain (1733 & 1773), France (1726) and the Holy Roman Empire (1754). Exchange rates and retariffed money made tables like the one in Dakin's scale set necessary.

On March 31, 1750 the government of Massachusetts-Bay Province passed an act giving conversion rates for paper money and coins⁶. Money exchange rates differed by State.^{7, 8} A table printed and sold by Gamaliel Rogers and John Fowle on Queen Street in Boston in 1750 can be found online. The table is hard to read, but it is transcribed on the Smithsonian web site. Highlights from the table are below.

> • An exact table to bring old tenor into lawful money. Also a table to know the value of pistoles, guineas, Johannes & double johannes, moydores, English crowns, half-crowns, shillings and copper half-pence, at the rate of dollars at six shillings a piece, at which invariable value they are fixed by a late act of this government. The act to be in force from and after the 31st of March 1750.

> • That from and after the 31st of March 1750, that Forty-five Shillings of the Old Tenor, and Eleven Shillings and three Pence of the new and middle Tenor, shall be equal to one Piece of Eight. (Note this is the exchange rate for paper money and 1s New Tenor = 4s Old Tenor)

• Any Books and Accounts, which shall not be made to conform to said Regulation, will not be admitted by said Act to be produced in Evidence, for the Recovery of any Debt in any of his Majesty's Courts within this Province.

PAPER MONEY BY MASSACHUSETTS-BAY PROVINCE LISTED ON THE DAKIN CARD

The first colonial paper currency was dated December 10, 1690. Production continued until 1750. In 1751 the English parliament passed the Currency act that banned the issuing of paper money by the New England colonies. About 50 different issues of notes were produced in that time. Some of the issues are shown below. The issues had the same face value until 1737, but the street values dropped significantly. In 1737

New Tenor or three-Fold Tenor were issued. They were worth 3 times as much as the older notes. In 1741 a 4X issue called New Tenor or New New Tenor was produced. Previous issues were called Middle Tenor. In 1748 one Spanish Dollar traded for 45s in Old Tenor and 11s3d of Middle Tenor or New Tenor. The last issue in 1750 was backed by Silver Dollars (Spanish 8 Reals) and called Lawful Money. It traded at 4½ pence per 1/16 Dollar (a 1/2 Real).

Surviving paper money from Massachusetts at the time of the Dalkin card is scarce. PMG⁹ is a company that grades currency and issues a population report that is a tally of notes certified by them. They have graded 22,000 pieces of continental and colonial currency, but only 14 pieces were issued by Massachusetts Bay from the initial printing in 1690 until the time of the Dalkin card, 1750.

There are six known February 3, 1690/91 20 Shillings Colonial banknotes, Figure 5. This "Bill of Credit" was issued by the Massachusetts Bay Colony to pay and stave off mutiny by its troops following a failed attempt to take Quebec from the French during King William's War against Canada. The war lasted October 18 - 24, 1890. The British lost about

1,000 men and contracted £40,000 in debt. These issues were the first paper money authorized by England.

By October of 1691, £10,000 in notes had been turned into the treasury in payment of taxes and were destroyed. People were not willing to accept the paper currency in daily exchanges at the same rate as coins so the General Court approved a tax of £30,000 to be collected in 1693-1694, which would retire most of the bills. One of the few surviving notes from the second Massachusetts emission is dated February 3, 1690 but the law authorizing the note was issued in December 1690. The date 1690 is in error. The denomination is a 20s, but the emission only included notes of 2s, 2s6d, £3 and £6. Its denomination was changed by a counterfeiter.

Massachusetts authorized £40,000 in paper money dated May 31, 1710. This money was later designated "Old Tenor". Some of the notes had red scrollwork to make it harder to modify the money. The scrollwork was not added to the four lowest denominations (2s-3s6d). This was to keep counterfeiters from erasing a low number and replacing it by hand with a higher number, i.e. 2s to 20s. Denominations for the May 31, 1710 issue were: 2s, 2s6d, 3s, 3s6d, 4s, 5s, 10s, 20s, 40s, 50s, £3 and £5. Figure 6 is probably genuine.

Small change bills, Figure 7, were authorized on July 7, 1737 at 6s8d per ounce of silver. That was three times the value of earlier notes. At the time of issuance these notes were called New Tenor bills and older notes were called Old Tenor. When four fold Tenor notes were issued in 1742, the 1737 issues became known as Middle Tenor and the Second New Tenor notes were simply called New Tenor.



New New Tenor was issued starting in 1741/2. The note in Figure 9 had a face value of 6p. The face value in Old Tenor was 2s (=24p). New Tenor was worth 4 times the value of Old Tenor. The ratio of new to old changed with time.

The last issue of paper money in Massachusetts until 1775 was in 1750, Figure 10. England passed the Currency Act in 1751 banning paper money issued by the New England colonies. The colonies had issued paper money to help pay for military expenses during the French and Indian Wars. They also were used to pay government expenses and collect taxes when hard money was not available. Due to a shortage of money, old notes continued to circulate at a discount to gold and silver coins. When the colonies printed money in 1775, they were not concerned with laws passed in England.

COINS LISTED ON DAKIN'S CARD

Coins listed on the Dakin card have survived in larger numbers than paper money. Most of the coins shown here are high grade and were sold at auction¹¹. The expected weight of the coins below per the Dakin card is shown in brackets after the coin's weight. Measured vs expected are similar. Many of the coins shown on the card have survived due to their bullion value.

GUINEA, HALF GUINEAS - ENGLISH GOLD COINS

The guinea was a British gold coin issued from 1663 to 1813. They were named for the chief source of their raw material: Guinea, a British colony on Africa's Gold Coast. It contained about ¼ ounce of gold and was equal to 42/3 Spanish dollars.

PORTUGUESE GOLD COINS - MOIDORE OR MOYDORE

Gold coins were minted from 1677 to 1910 in Portugal and Portuguese colonies. They circulated in the American colonies and the Caribbean.

They came in several denominations:

- 4000 réis also called a moidore from moeda de ouro or money of gold. Figure 12

- 6400 réis called a joe or half joe. It was the Latin name of King João V. A 6400 réis was 4 escudos. The coin was valued at 36s (4 escudos). They also issued 18s (2 escudos) and 9s (1 escudos) coins.

- 12800 réis also called a Joe, Double Joe or 8 escudos was valued at £3/12s. Figure 2

Portugal issued an 8-escudo gold coin worth $\pounds 3/12s$ through the first half of the

18th century. A scale maker in New England in Boston would have called the coin a 12,800 Reis or a double Joe. The other North American Colonies called it a Joe. The Portuguese called it a Dobra. In British money 3 pounds 12 shillings contained 0.84744 AGW¹³. A Portuguese

double Joe contained 0.8455 AGW. Portuguese gold coin denominations were: 8, 4, 2 & 1 Escudos. Spain and her colonies also issued 8, 4, 2 & 1 Escudos coins. Spanish coins were lighter, less desirable and not listed in Dakin's table.

ONE, TWO AND FOUR PISTOLE – EUROPEAN GOLD COINS

Pistole is a French name given to Spanish gold coins in use from 1537. The name was also given to other European gold coins with similar values. The word pistole may come from the Czech word píšťala ("whistle", a term for a hand cannon).¹⁴

The English Crown first appeared in 1526. It was made with "crown gold" and had a value of five shillings (a quarter of a pound). By 1551, silver was used to produce crowns. It was 38mm, 92.5% silver and weighed about one Troy ounce. After the Union of England and Scotland in 1707 a new coin, the British Crown, replaced the English Crown and Scottish Dollar. It was worth 5 shillings. The reverse features shields of England, Ireland, Scotland and the Hanoverian Duchy of Brunswick & Luneberg.

This coin, Figure 14, George II Crown; 1743; Weight: 30.1002 (30.19) grams; actual silver weight (ASW)¹¹: 0.8951¹³; 38.61 mm.

Dollar, Half Dollar, Quarter Dollar – Spanish 8, 4 & 2 Real silver coins

The first real was introduced by King Pedro I of Castile in the mid 14th century. The silver real was minted in ½-, 1-, 2-, 4- and 8-real denominations. The 8-real coin (one dollar, one peso or a piece of eight) was issued by Spain and her colonies. It became an internationally recognized trade coin when silver was discovered in Mexico, Peru and Bolivia in the 16th century.

NOT ALL COIN WEIGHTS MATCH THE DAKIN CARD

My friend's collection includes five other weights, Figure 16. Table 101 is a comparison of the measured weight in grams vs the expected weight calculated from Penny Weight (dwt) and Grains (gra) in Dakin's table.

Four pieces match well: £3 12S, 36S, 27S & 2D14Gr. The 2 Pistole piece is countermarked, Figure 18, and is 50% lighter than Dakin's card suggests. Stamped on the weight are lower values than Dakin's table: 5D4Gr vs. 8D14Gr. The Eighteen Shillings, 18s, piece was filed on its edges and the weight in grams is 16% below its expected weight.

Classification of coin weights is beyond the scope of this article. The Equilibrium has published several articles on the subject. English Coin-Weights by Norman Biggs¹⁵ was published in a series of 9 articles from 1986 to 1988. It is an excellent place to start reading about coin weights.



CONCLUSION

Currency exchange and counterfeit detection were an important part of business in 1750. Currency conversion tables were offered by many governments and businessmen. A book published by Tom Snelling in 1764 had 240 pages and 25 plates¹⁶. It showed how to identify genuine money and gave the relative values of 450 coins. Benjamin Franklin published a table of values for coinage in the North American colonies in 17517 that is similar to the Dakin card, Figure 19. A more recent book was written by John J. McCusker (1992): Money and Exchange in Europe and America, 1600-1775, A Handbook⁸. The handbook has the same function as the Dakin card. It allows modern readers to convert currencies of major European cities and the British colonies.



They get a special attaboy since the outside temperature where he was standing was in excess of 100 degrees as he was tending the fire. The first order of business was to approve the officer reports and send thoughts and prayers to ill members. Visitors recognized: Richard S., Michael P. New member: Kristina L. The August program was given by Mike R. on Liberty Head Eagles minted 1838-1907. \$10 Eagles were authorized by the Coinage Act of 1792, with production beginning in 1795. The exchange ratio of gold to silver was set at 15:1. This was lower than the world market ratio, and as a result most US Gold coins minted prior to 1834 were sent to Europe and melted for its arbitrage. This caused the mint to stop production of Eagles after 1804. Congress finally raised the ratio to 16:1 in 1834 and started producing Liberty Head Eagles in 1838. Three design types have been identified: Covered Ear, 1838-39; Without Motto 1839-1866; and With Motto 1866-1907. The design was utilized for 70 years. All mints produced \$10 Libs except Dahlonega and Charlotte; these mints made no gold coins above \$5 half eagles. Liberty Head Liberties were not generally collected by year and mintmark (due to cost), and assembling a set in high grade is virtually impossible. However, there are later dates where examples are plentiful. Mike displayed several examples of Liberty Head Eagles after the presentation, garnering lots of interest from members. All youth in attendance received a door prize. Adult door prizes went to Larry P., Frank H. and Ronnie S. The auction of the normal 40 items was held.

SEPTEMBER MEETING: President Frank H. opened the meeting with 36 members and visitors present. Officer reports were approved. Donations for the October auction are still being accepted. Program: "ANACS" By: George M. Our own George M. is our local ANACS representative and sets up at many local shows. Gave an insightful presentation on why slab your coins through ANACS. George mentioned it's one of the best bangs for your buck and gave four reasons: 1) Prove coin is Genuine. 2) Protection. 3) If you sell it, to obtain the right value/liquidity. 4)Narrows the price gap. NGC is the dominant third-party grader in the market and uses a 4 prong inside the holder. With larger format Slabs ANACS cannot do them larger than 65mm, foreign, 50-60mm. PCGS also uses a 3-prong holder inside the holder. Currently the top tier is NGC, PCGS and ANACS. CSC and ICG are also options but don't command the market prices. NGC and PCGS both require memberships to submit for encapsulation. There are fees per coin. George mentioned ANACS currently does show specials. It's very prevalent to cross slabs and 5-10% come from other Third-Party Grading companies. Please assess the coin and not the holder. There are many custom holders such as 1st strike for example. George brought an example submission form to discuss the process and tiers of service. You can also choose an insurance coverage and current promotion is \$14 per coin special. High value coins should be discussed in person at a show. It involves an extra process. Every coin submitted is assigned a serial number. There is currently a lot of action on error coins and they're very hot right now. George usually brings magnets with him to assess if the coin is genuine. George does a lot of tests as a lot of fakes come to the table. Problem coins were returned in "Body Bags" at the beginning of encapsulation. The insurance policy is in effect and Slab is acoustically sealed. If you don't pay for the attribution or notate on the form, it won't be noted on the Slab. The other categories and their winners were Most Historically Significant: Cameroon, 200 Francs, Silver, "Sumerian Civilization". Best Contemporary Coin: Ukraine, 10 Hyrvnias, Silver, "The Courage to Be". Best Silver Coin: Austria, 20 Euro, Silver, "The Neutron Star". Best Crown Coin: Cook Islands, 10 Dollar, Silver, "The Astrolabe". Best Circulating Coin: China, 5 Yuan, Brass, "Sheng Role - Chinese Peking Opera Art". Best Bi-Metallic Coin: Austria, 25 Euro, Silver - Nobium, "Global Heating". Most Artistic Coin: Latvia's 5 Euro, Silver, "Riga Fashion". Most Innovative: France, 200 Euro, Gold, "Pierre Herme', 3-dimensional marvel, Macaroon". Most Inspirational Coin: Canada, 50 Dollar, Silver, "Allegory of Peace". The obverse of the winning design, from the US, was designed by Elana Hailer and sculpted by Joseph Mennna. The obverse features a bristle cone pine, species native to CA, NV and UT, and is one of the oldest living organisms on earth. 

The act also required the removal of an equal dollar amount of silver certificates from circulation and the replacement of the currency with Federal Reserve Bank notes. As a result of the act, more than 270 million silver dollars were melted and converted into silver bars. The mint began minting the replacement silver dollars in 1921 and the majority were replaced in the next 2 years. As a result, production of smaller denomination silver coins was limited since the mint was busy minting the replacement dollars. Mintages of 1921 dimes, guarters, and halves were very low in 1921, and none of these denominations were produced in 1922. Only cents and dollars were produced in 1922, and the cents were only minted in Denver. Regular monthly drawings were conducted and Tony B was the winner of the membership drawing: a 1949P half dollar. Raffle prize winners were Sylvia C, Tony Z, Tommy R, Robert L, Kendal W, and Rob R. Tony Z and Connolly O conducted the 63-lot auction from 7 consignors.

OCTOBER MEETING: The October meeting was called to order by President Randy B. with 25 members and 1 visitor, Javier M, in attendance. Officer reports were given and approved. Last month there was discussion on whether to have our regular meeting in December or to have a Christmas dinner at a local restaurant. After more discussion, it was decided to just have our regular meeting on the second Monday of December. President Randy B offered the possibility of moving our meeting place to the Carnegie Library in Vernon. Per Randy, the library has a nice room with tables, chairs, and much better lighting than we have at our current meeting place. Plus, there would be no charge for using the room. After a discussion, the motion passed to move to the new location. Announcements were made on the health of various members. Regular monthly drawings were conducted and Jimmy S was the winner of the membership drawing: a 1963-D Franklin Half Dollar. Raffle prize winners were Sylvia C, Tony Z, Kendal W, Del S, and Julio C. Tony Z and Connolly O conducted the 84-lot auction from 11 consignors.

WICHITA FALLS CC AUGUST MEETING: The meeting was called to order with 28 members and 1 guest, Javier M, present. Officer reports were given and approved. Upcoming shows were announced. Rob R initiated a discussion about a club Christmas Party location, and the members voted to schedule the party. Tony Z said that he will schedule a date and time with Jason's Deli for the Coin Club Christmas

Party. Tony Z presented information from an article in Coin World from April 2024. Tony explained that during World War 1, Great Britain was trying to raise money to continue to finance the waging of war against the Central Powers. He explained that the Pittman Act was passed by Congress in April 23, 1918 and was sponsored and named after Senator Key Pittman of Nevada which was a large silver producing state. He mentioned the Comstock Mine which was the largest US silver mine at that time. Tony said that the Pittman Act authorized the melting of up to 350,000,000 standard silver dollars into bullion bars for sale or use for subsidiary silver coinage, and directed purchase of domestic silver for recoinage of a like number of dollars. The total number of silver dollars melted into bullion, under the Pittman Act were called for the temporary removal from circulation of an equivalent value of Silver Certificates. The silver certificates were to be replaced with a new issuance of federal reserve bank Notes. Under the Pittman Act, 270,232,722 standard silver dollars were converted into bullion (259,121,554 for sale to Great Britain for \$1 per fine ounce, plus mint charges and 11,111,168 for subsidiary silver coinage). Tony said that the price of silver at the time was about \$0.69 per ounce. Additionally, Tony pointed out that the action used the equivalent of about 209,000,000 fine ounces of silver. Between 1920 and 1933, under the Pittman Act, the same quantity of silver was purchased from the output of American mines at \$1 per ounce, which provided silver for minting or "recoining" 270,232,722 standard silver dollars. Tony pointed out that the fixed price of \$1 per ounce was above the market rate and acted as a federal subsidy to the silver mining industry. He described that the passage of the Pittman Act led to most coins of lesser denomination having much lower mintages in 1921, and no mintages of lower coin denominations (less than one dollar) in 1922. Rob said in all the years he has collected half cents, he had never seen one displaying this anomaly. Per Rob, his source books say that fewer than 30 examples exist with this cud. Since few numismatists collect half cents by date, and even fewer by die state, Rob was able to obtain this very rare coin for a price below dealer bid for a normal 1808/7. 

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


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
