FROM THE PRESIDENT

Happy Spring 2024...

My fellow collectors and members of the Texas Numismatic Association, we are now within six months of our annual convention. This time the convention is little out of the comfort zone for our northern part of the state. While we were in the comforts of the Arlington Convention Center, we relished a bit of complacency as two presidents, Richard Laster and Debbie Williams guided us through the financial and other difficulties of a bulky organization spread over one of the largest areas only bowing to the American Numismatic Association which encompasses a much larger area. No major decisions took place that could not be handled with the experts and experienced personnel that we had as our resources. I call now

on the membership to come to forefront and help keep us afloat. We are in need of at least 40-50 volunteers to handle the mechanics of running the convention in Conroe, Texas. We need to handle the influx of conventioneers in the form of registration, assisting dealers with errands and needs, and assisting exhibitors and other presenters keeping things moving smoothly. Please email me with your name and contact information if you wish to volunteer. This volunteering comes with benefits like free admission and compensation back to your local club.

So far this time around we have had to replace a few governors as veterans felt the need to step down. We have a new Bourse chairman in a new facility and reduced space for exhibits, youth activities in a smaller space along with other size restricted areas. On the bright side the Lone Star Convention Center offers us free parking for a good-sized army of attendees.

This is also my chance to congratulate the lucky winners of the ANA Summer Seminar scholarships. Pat Schwenker, the co-recipient of the coveted GHCC Townsend Award, was the impartial puller of the lucky tickets in the drawing. I make note that the drawing was not without a hitch the first name drawn unfortunately had been submitted by a former member with a lapsed membership of over ten years. Another name was drawn with proper eligibility. Our ANA Summer Seminar winners are James Haney and Rick Ewing and the five Library Improvement winners are Jack Gilbert, Vernon Runyan, Hal Cherry, John Gilliland and Kevin Kell. I extend congratulations to those seven individuals. Our treasurer, Jack Gilbert, advised that there were 41 persons that chose to submit their names for the drawing. These scholarships provide for travel from your home to Colorado Springs and back, tuition, meals and lodging for the week. For those of you who have never been to the ANA Summer Seminar and were curious it is an experience like no other in collecting. When you are not in class you can sit at tables for meals with a chance to sit next to and chat with former ANA Presidents, Ken Bressett, Editor Emeritus of the Red Book, get his autograph on your Red Book, and any and all instructors of the courses offered will chat also. There are numerous after class one hour talks on at least a half dozen topics every week. The infamous "Lunar Lounge" starts up just after dark on the patio outside the apartments where adult beverages are enjoyed while many of the attendees revel in tales of coin adventures and sometimes things not even remotely related to coins are shared. Our visitors from other countries are usually present.

I would like to say it would be even better if every member that was eligible would sign up to be eligible for the drawing it's a perk of the membership and you should try. You are in the hobby to learn, why not raise the level of knowledge in your neck of the neighborhood. Be a good collector and raise yourself to a great knowledgeable about your area of collecting.

2010 MEXICAN REVOLUTION CENTENNIAL 100-PESOS NOTE

In 2010, Mexico celebrated two important anniversaries: the centennial of its 1910 revolution and the bicentennial of its 1810 independence from Spain.

A 100-pesos note for the revolution and a 200-pesos note for independence were issued that year by the Banco de Mexico. Here you see the 100-pesos polymer note.

The President of Mexico, Felipe Calderón, designated 2010 as the "Año de la Patria", or the "Year of the Nation." November 20, 1910, is celebrated as the date the Mexican Revolution began. That is when the first attack against the leadership of Porfirio Diaz took place, which was led by several revolutionaries including Francisco "Pancho" Villa, Pascual Orozco, Emiliano Zapata, Francisco Madero, and Venustiano Carranza. It brought an end to the dictatorship, and Mexico became a constitutional republic.

The main feature on the obverse of the note is a locomotive that represents the movement of revolutionary troops to participate in the armed insurrection which started in 1910. Next to the train

is an image of the camp followers. Also, on the obverse at the top left is "2010 Centenario de la Revolucion Mexicana" and at the top right is "Banco de Mexico Cien Pesos." In the lower left is a transparent watermark in the likeness of the top of a corn stalk with leaves. "100 Pesos Cien Anos" and the serial number are in the lower center. The main feature on the reverse of the note is part of a mural by Davis Alfaro Siqueiros titled, "From the Porfirio Regime to the Revolution."

SYMBOLISM ON THE 1994 PRISONER-OF-WAR COMMEMORATIVE COIN

The minting of coins involves various people from congress approving the minting of coins, sculptors and artists who design coins, metallurgists coordinating precious metals, machinists minting coins, business professionals and transportation specialists managing the distribution of coins along with others.

Under PUBLIC LAW 103-186, TITLE II—UNITED STATES VETERANS COMMEMORATIVE COINS, approved on December 14, 1993, the Secretary of Treasury was mandated to issue one-dollar coins of three distinctive designs, including the PRISONER-OF-WAR commemorative coin.

With the following specifications:

- 1. Weigh 26.73 grams.
- 2. Have a diameter of 1.5 inches.
- 3. Contain 90% silver and 10% copper.
- 4. Carry an inscription of the year 1994.

Surcharges from the sale of this coin funded the Department of the Interior's construction of the Andersonville Prisoner-of-War Museum in Andersonville, Georgia. Any additional funds were to be split equally between setting up an endowment fund for the maintenance of the museum and maintaining national cemeteries.

The symbolism on the Prisonerof-War Commemorative Coin is amazing.

The obverse features an American eagle taking flight after breaking free through a ring of barbed wire with a broken chain around its ankle, symbolic of its flight towards freedom. Between the eagle's outstretched wings is the word "LIBERTY" and to the right of the eagle is the word "FREEDOM." Thomas Nielsen, a decorated Vietnam veteran and Department of Veterans Affairs employee designed the obverse.

The reverse features the proposed design for the National Prisoner-

of-War Museum in Andersonville, Georgia. It is located at Camp Sumter, one of the largest Confederate military prisons established during the Civil War.

The National Park Service opened the National Prisoner of War Museum in 1998 with the purpose of telling the story and experiences of prisoners-of-war throughout American history.

Today we can continue to appreciate the history and symbolism on commemorative coins as we celebrate and recognize the many people, places and events that shaped our nation's rich history.





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GERMAN CHANCELLOR ANGELA MERKEL, 2005-2021, HONORED ON A GERMAN MEDAL

Angela Merkel was born July 17, 1954, in Hamburg, West Germany. She was the first female Chancellor of Germany and was the longest serving Chancellor, only after Bismark. Her father was a Lutheran minister who moved the family to East Germany when she was an infant, as he received pastorate at the church in Quitzow East Germany. The family settled in the countryside fifty-six miles north of East Berlin. She earned a PhD in quantum chemistry in 1986. Her apartment was actually located facing the Berlin Wall.

Angela Merkel first entered politics briefly serving as deputy Spokesperson for the first democratically elected government of East Germany in 1989. She was a protege of her predecessor Chancellor Helmut Kohl. Before becoming Chancellor in 2005, she had become a member of the Christian Democratic Union (CDU) party of Germany. She was often referred to as the defacto leader of the European Union (EU) and was once the most powerful woman in the world. During the European debt crises of 2007-2008 she was

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credited as having "saved the Euro." The austerity measures imposed on debtors, especially in Greece, led to a Greek magazine featuring her portrait flanked by "swastikas." One disgruntled European made the absurd remark that "Merkel was Hitler's daughter!"

During the European migrant crises of 2015, she famously stated "wir schaffen das," "we can do this." In 2015 Time magazine featured a newly made portrait of Merkel on the cover as Person of the Year. To the left below her name was "CHANCELLOR OF THE FREE WORLD". She actually met with many migrants and also posed for selfies. Many refugees chanted "Merkel...Merkel!" In Germany she was fondly referred as "Mutti," "Mom." Refugees passed through some European countries that sealed railroad stations off to make sure no refugees dared set foot in their country!

During the outbreak of Covid in 2020, she addressed the German nation on television stating "...since

the Second World War, there has not been a challenge for our country in which action in a spirit of solidarity on our part which was so important." In 2022 the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees granted Merkel the Nansen Award. The Nansen project goes back to post-WW I helping displaced people. The Nansen Award was for her "courage and compassion" during the crisis.

The medal is made of a nickel alloy. Merkel is facing front with "ANGELA MERKEL" above and the German Reichtag, or Parliament, in the background. Below is "1.DEUTSCHE BUNDESKANLERIN," "1.(first) German Chancellor(feminine)." On the reverse is "DIE KANZLER DER BUNDESREPUBLIK DEUTSCHLAND," "The(feminine) Chancellor of (the) Federal Republic (of) Germany. In the background is the map of Germany with the German Federal eagle placed approximately where the capital city of Berlin is located.

COINS IN CHEERIO CEREAL BOXES

In the year 2000 General Mills had an advertising campaign with the US Mint combined with millions of dollars in advertising for the new millennium. The mint delivered 10-million Lincoln cents to be inserted in boxes of Cheerio cereal.


General Mills advertised the coins as being one of the "first pennies of the new millennium." The new, shiny cents were encapsulated in a plastic blister pack mounted on black cardboard. The card was labeled "one of the 10,000,000 first-minted year 2000 coins" and also decorated with images of cents. All of the cents were from the Philadelphia Mint but all the illustrations on the card show an "S" mint mark on the coins. Included in the advertising promotion was every 2000th box of Cheerios had a cent and a Sacagawea dollar.

A shiny mint 2000 cent is valued at one cent, but those in original Cheerio packaging normally sell in excess of \$20. It is estimated that about 10% of these coins are the wide A M reverse variety, but the only way to determine that would be to remove the coins from the original packaging, which is not recommended.

I was surprised that General Mills was selling 10-million boxes of Cheerios. The most ironic part of the story is that the new millennium was actually January 01, 2001.







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UGANDA 1969 25 SHILLINGS

Pope Paul VI visited Africa in 1969, becoming the first reigning Pope to ever visit the continent. He arrived in Entebbe Airport, Uganda on July 31, 1969, and was greeted by the Ugandan President and four other heads of African states. The Catholic Church in Africa was rapidly growing at the time, and the Pope's visit helped to increase its visibility.

The Uganda 1969 25 Shillings, issued by the Bank of Uganda, commemorated this visit. The obverse features a half-length figure, right arm raised in blessing superimposed on world globe, and the national coat of arms on the reverse. The coin is .999 silver, 1.6059 oz.

ZIMBABWE ONE-DOLLAR COIN Pat Weems, Gateway Coin Club, Inc. of San Antonio





The Republic of Zimbabwe (formerly the Republic of Rhodesia or Southern Rhodesia), is located in the east central part of Southern Africa. This 1993 one dollar, KM# 6, is composed of copper-nickel metal. The obverse shows the protective bird of Zimbabwe. The bird is the national emblem of Zimbabwe, appearing in the national flags as well on banknotes and coins. The bird probably represents the Bateleur eagle or the African fish eagle. The reverse depicts the remains of an ancient city of stone built between the 13th and 14th century, flanked by two Milkwood trees.

ANNIE OAKLEY SHARPSHOOTER MEDAL

One of my favorite areas of collecting is western memorabilia, especially western tokens and medals.

In the days of the old west, many men and women had an impact on our history. Names of famous and infamous individuals were making history, many who reached the status of celebrity. Notables like Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, Belle Star, Jesse James, Etta Place, Sam Bass, Elfego Baca, Annie Oakley, Calamity Jane, Pat Garrett, and many more are listed in historical records.

One of the most well-known sharpshooters of the old west was Phoebe Ann Moses, better known as Annie Oakley. Annie became a sharpshooter and a skillful hunter just to put food on the table for her widowed mother, six siblings, and herself. At the age of fifteen she was already well-known as

a skillful sharpshooter. Word of her talent with a gun reached a businessman who arranged a shooting contest between Oakley and Frank Butler, an expert marksman. Targets were set up and Butler hit twentyfour of his twenty-five targets. He lost the match when Annie hit all twenty-five, and she was declared the winner. Later, he started a courtship with Annie and married her in Windsor, Ontario, Canada.


Soon they were performing together in circuses as sharpshooters. As their popularity grew, Butler decided to manage Annie as a solo act. In 1885 Buffalo Bill asked Annie to join his wild west show. The Butlers performed their work in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show until 1901 when they retired. Annie's skill with a rifle eventually led to her being called one of the most impressive sharpshooters of the old wild

west. During her career, she performed for many dignitaries, including Sitting Bull, Thomas Edison, Prince Edward, and for Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in England.

Annie Oakley is remembered as "Little Sure Shot," a name that was given to her by her friend Sitting Bull, who was also a member of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show.

The obverse of the silver medal shows an image of Annie Oakley between two bullseye targets. The text reads "Little Miss Sure Shot." At the bottom, the name Annie Oakley is between two bullets. The reverse reads, "Born Near Willow Dell, Ohio, August 13, 1860; Died Greenfield, Ohio, November 3, 1926." The date "1971," when the medal was issued, is at the bottom of the reverse. The diameter of the medal is 39mm.





AN OLD WEST POSTAL NOTE FROM TEXAS SURFACES – IN EUROPE!

Collectors never know when or where lightning will strike, and a desirable piece of history will surface!

In the March, 2022 issue of TNA News we presented a survey of the surviving Postal Notes issued in Texas. At that time, 20 were known to collectors. Since then, not one new Texas Postal Note has been observed and reported — until now.

In late 2023, Postal Note collectors were excited to learn that the first Texas Postal Note in more than 20 months had surfaced. And not in any of the usual auctions or dealers' offerings. It popped-up some 5,300 miles from the point of issue -- one-third of the way around our planet -- in Europe!

ABOUT THE NOTE

Fort Davis Postal Note number 003914 was purchased on Friday, October 25, 1889 – 44 years after Texas joined the Union and the same year the state's first prohibition campaign was mounted (in Fort Worth). Although the note has a face value of one cent, it cost the purchaser four Indian Head cents or perhaps a three-cent coin accompanied by an Indian cent -- due to the threecent issuance fee. The one cent face value establishes this note as a souvenir, like so many of the known notes. It may have been acquired by an army officer as a reminder of his posting to this remote and beautiful west Texas location. Or by a highly adventurous tourist retracing the historic Butterfield Overland Stage route through this semiarid region on horseback.

After this note surfaced, we added it to the list of known Texas notes (see Table 2, end of article). With Google's assistance, we located Fort Davis near the 28th state's border with Mexico (Figure 1). It's the westernmost Texas Postal Note surviving for modern collectors, researchers, historians, and frontier Texas memorabilia enthusiasts.



Echoing the history of their immediate ancestors, the Postage and Fractional Currency notes of 1862 to 1876, numerous changes were made to Postal Notes during their 1883 to 1894 issuance period. They were produced under three federal laws, by three private production companies, on two different papers, in two different sizes, and in five major and three minor designs. Fort Davis number 003914 is catalogued as Type IV by collectors. It was engraved by T.F. Morris while he worked for the American Bank Note Company during the second production contract (1887-1891). Five ABNCo-produced Type IV and two Type IV-A Postal Notes from Texas are currently known.

This Fort Davis Postal Note was offered in December 2023 as eBay lot number 204565981978. It sold to an unknown collector for \$1,032.17 plus taxes and delivery fees.

The first Fort Davis Postal Note was likely issued on September 3, 1883. After calculating the number of issuing weeks between the inaugural date and the date on the note, we estimate that roughly 12 Postal Notes were issued in Fort Davis each week. A second computation, projecting that rate of issuance through the series' end in June 1894, indicated a total of 6,890 Postal Notes might possibly have been issued there.

Fort Davis number 003914 travelled from a tiny army outpost on the isolated American frontier, overland via stagecoach and rail to the east coast, carried aboard a ship to Europe, and finally to the Netherlands. Somehow this fragile note survived intact for 134 years. How it did, as Winston Churchill was fond of saying, is a riddle wrapped in a mystery inside an enigma.

ABOUT FORT DAVIS, TEXAS

Fort Davis is located in south central Jeff Davis County in the mostly desolate, sometimes mountainous terrain of far western Texas. The county just touches the Rio Grande River and the Mexican border at its westernmost point. Fort Davis, the county's main population center, is about 80 miles northeast

of Presidio, nearly 200 miles southeast of El Paso, and 400 miles from San Antonio. Modern travelers can find the town at the intersection of State highways 17 and 118. At 4,892 feet above sea level, Fort Davis has the highest elevation of any county seat in Texas.

Fort Davis was founded as a frontier military post in 1854. Its' mission: to protect survey parties, settlers, mail, wagon trains, and supplies travelling on the 600-mile, economically important San Antonio-El Paso Road, one of the dusty southern pathways to the gold fields of California.

Fort Davis was one of many way stations of the Butterfield Overland Stage, which had a \$600,000 per year government contract to carry the mail to and from West Coast cities. Twice each week, every Monday and Thursday, its Concord coaches and Celerity wagons traversed the dangerous territory between Tipton (St. Louis), Missouri and San Francisco. The 2,795mile trip took 21 to 25 days. Passengers paid \$200 for a one-way ticket. Founded in September 1858, Congress ordered the company to cease operation in March 1861, in favor of a shorter, more northerly route.

The fort was named after Jefferson Davis, who was the nation's Secretary of War. (He later became president of the Confederate States.) It was an active U.S. army base from 1854 to 1891, with a five-year hiatus during the Civil War. In June 1891, as part of the army's efforts to consolidate its frontier garrisons, Fort Davis was abandoned, having "outlived its usefulness."

Unlike Fort Worth, a frontier army post that expanded into a major city, Fort Davis has enjoyed limited population growth. The same is relatively true for Jeff Davis County. In 1890, fewer than 1,200 people were estimated to live in Fort Davis and 1,394 in all of Jeff Davis County. The 2020 census recorded a population of 1,024 for Fort Davis, with 1,996 residents in the entire county (see Table 1).



CONCLUSION

Official government statistics document the issuance of 2.5 million Postal Notes in Texas during their 12-year series — with a national total of 70.8 million. To date, a total of 21 Texas notes have been observed — an estimated survival rate of one note for about every 120,000 issued. That compares to one survivor for every 31,000 notes issued on a national basis.

Of course, we only know of one note from Fort Davis.

Where are the surviving Postal Notes issued in other famous Old West Texas towns like Abilene, El Paso, and Fort Worth? Have any notes survived from Lone Star towns with unique and fascinating names like Ben Franklin, Buffalo Gap, Lumber, Rising Star, or Waxahachie?

You never know where your next great find will come from, so keep hunting. Lightning might strike, and your next great discovery could be waiting for you when and where you least expect it.

OVERVIEW OF U.S. POSTAL NOTES

Text excerpt from "The Surviving Postal Notes of Texas - A 17-Year Update", TNA News, March 2022 Available in its entirety at TNA.org

More than 70 million Postal Notes were issued by U.S. post offices from 1883 to 1894. During that era, 2,555,291 were issued in Texas – about 3.6% of the national total.

Postal Notes are the direct descendants of the Postal and Fractional Currency notes produced and distributed by the U.S. Treasury Department. Issued with face values ranging from three to 50 cents, these diminutive notes were used extensively by the American public -- from 1862 to 1876. Postal Notes were issued in two sizes, in two paper colors, by three private production companies. Collectors and researchers

recognize seven Types and Sub-Types, plus several varieties among the 70+ million issued. Numerous first day and last day notes, most with face values of one or two cents, were acquired as souvenirs. The current census indicates only 2,186 notes of all Types have survived.

The total number of Texas post offices issuing Postal Notes was 214 on the series' inaugural date: September 3, 1883. On the last day of issue, June 30, 1894, 689 locations were authorized: 634 were Money Order Offices and 55 Postal Note Offices.

In the most recent Friedberg catalog introduction to Fractional Currency, the authors state that less than \$2 million of all designs has survived from the total \$369 million (face value) produced. That's a survival rate of roughly 0.54%, or a dollar's worth for every \$184.50 worth sent into

circulation.

Now consider the survival rate for Postal Notes. Overall, the survival rate for the entire United States is about 0.003% or one survivor for every 32,500 notes issued. Looking specifically at Texas, the survival rate is approximately 0.0008%. That's an average of one survivor for every 127,765 notes issued.

Postal Note collecting is increasing in numismatic, syngraphic and philatelic popularity, as indicated by the broadening number of books and periodicals delivering listings, articles and the latest research. In addition to a growing list of articles in national and regional publications, a Postal Note section by Bob Laub has been added to the 22nd edition of Paper Money of the United States by Ira and Arthur Friedberg.

POPULAR POSTAL NOTE COLLECTING MOTIFS: A TEXAS PERSPECTIVE

Here's a brief look at the most popular ways collectors organize their Postal Notes and how the currently known Texas notes fit these approaches.

Type Set: One example each of the seven recognized design types and sub-types. Not currently possible to complete. No Type II notes issued in Texas are known.

Printer Set: One note from each of the three private production companies. Completable, though only by three lucky collectors. The reason: only three notes produced by the Homer Lee Bank Note Company are known.

Alpha-Omega Set: One example each of the first and last designs. This two-note set is potentially completable. But only by the fortunate collector who possesses the single Type I note from Jacksborough.

First Day, Last Day Set: One note issued on September 3, 1883 and one on June 30, 1894. Not a possibility yet. No first day of issue notes from Texas have survived. (The earliest known Texas note was issued on January 22, 1885.)

Year Set: One Postal Note issued in each year from 1883 to 1894. Not possible. No notes issued in 1883, 1884 and 1886 have survived. Or perhaps they just haven't yet surfaced.

County Set: One note from each county in a State. Not possible today and highly unlikely in the future. Postal Notes are known from only 15 of the state's 254 counties.

1) On struck pieces, what is the difference between "medal turn" and "coin turn"?

The terms "medal turn" and "coin turn" relate to how the dies are oriented in the press, and thus how the coin designs on the obverse and reverse align with each other. Almost all U.S. coins are made with coin turn - that is if you turn the coin over along its vertical axis (like turning pages in a book), the reverse will appear upside down. British coins are made with medal turn, and bookwise turning of the coin results in the reverse showing right side up. Sometimes numismatists use a shorthand notation of two arrows facing up to denote medal turn ^^ and two arrow facing opposite directions Av to denote coin turn. Knowing how the real coins were made can prove useful in unmasking counterfeits, as these "mints" often get it wrong when orienting their obverses and reverses.

2) What is a "scyphate" coin?

The Scyphate coin is a term sometimes used to refer to cup-shaped coins. Most prominent among these are Byzantine coins of the 11th-14th centuries. They have a concave side and a convex side, with designs on both. As to why they were made this way, questioning of Byzantine and medieval coin experts at an ANA Show turned up only an answer that "these thin coins would stack more easily if they were cup-shaped." Dr. Coyne has not heard any more convincing reasons why they were made this way.







Mr. John Reich (Johann Matthaus Reich) came to the United States around 1800 and was employed as "second engraver" at the Philadelphia Mint 1807-1817. He redesigned virtually all of the nation's coins, but put his initials on none of them. In our time, some numismatists have come to believe that his "signature" was a nick or deformation of one ray of the 13th star on each of his obverse designs. He left the employ of the Mint in 1817, having never gotten a raise during his tenure there.

4) What is different about coins struck in a segmented collar from coins struck in an ordinary collar?

The collar is a strong metal ring which surrounds the planchet at the moment of striking to constrain the planchet and prevent it expanding in a radial direction under pressure. An ordinary collar is an unbroken ring which may be plain or have vertical reeding on the face which meets the edge of the planchet. A segmented collar is a much more complicated device composed of pieces which are geared to move away from the coin edge a moment after striking. There are typically three segments. The face of the segmented collar which is against the coin at the moment of striking can be engraved with incuse or raised lettering, thus impressing a message on the edge of the coin. The segments then move apart from each other and from the edge of the struck coin to avoid scraping off the newly applied lettering as the coin is ejected. A collector may be able to see a faint vertical witness line on the edge of the coin among the lettering. This is where the segments met.

5) Did the U.S. mint at Charlotte ever strike silver coins?

The U.S. Mint at Charlotte, North Carolina was active from 1838 to early 1861 striking gold coins only. No silver or copper denominations were ever coined. Coinage operations at this branch mint ceased when the bullion ran out after the start of the Civil War. The mint building was later dismantled and moved several miles and rebuilt. Today it is the Mint Museum of Art.

6) How does one "ring" a coin to help distinguish a genuine one from a fake?

The "ring test" is an easy-to-perform test which may help distinguish a cast copy from a struck original coin. The crude way to perform the test is to simply drop the piece to be tested on a hard surface and listen to the sound it makes as it bounces. But this procedure can leave unsightly edge dings. It is better to balance the test coin on a fingertip and gently strike its edge with a pencil or pen and listen for the ring. A "'thud" confirms a casting or an electrotype. But, alas, the ring test is not conclusive; there are casts that "ring" fairly well, and there are struck pieces with original planchet problems that do not "ring" very well. Dr. Coyne recommends using this test only in conjunction with other evidence one way or the other.

7) When did the longest vacancy occur at the post of Chief Engraver of the U.S. Mint?

For two centuries beginning in 1793 the post of Chief Engraver was held by a series of talented artists and skilled engravers who proposed and executed new designs for the nation's coins and medals. But at the end of Elizabeth Jones' term in 1991, no one was appointed. Outside artists were used. By 1974, John Mercanti was already on staff at the U.S. Mint, but was not appointed Chief engraver until 2006. The engraver's post went vacant again in 2011 when Mercanti went on to private employment. Joseph Menna became the 14th Chief Engraver of the United States Mint in February 2019, and he continues in office.

8) What design feature was added to the obverse of the half dimes, quarters, and half dollars from the Coinage Act of 1853?

The silver issues of 1853 through 1855 had arrows at the date denoting a small reduction in the weight of contained silver. This change made them into "subsidiary" coins and made them less attractive for melting and export. The face value exceeded the intrinsic value. The program was successful until the Civil War when most federal-issue coins of all kinds were driven into hiding.



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
ANOTHER LOOK AT THE INDIAN HEAD QUARTER AND HALF EAGLES

United States gold coin series have been highly sought after sets of pieces within the bigger sphere of United States coinage for decades now, and two of the final circulating pieces of U.S. gold share a design – the Indian Head image. These have become especially popular of late, and can provide several collecting challenges.

THE INTRIGUE OF THE DESIGN

These last of the quarter and half eagles are the artistry of Mr. Bela Lyon Pratt. For those of us who wish to collect based not on specific coins, but rather on a specific artist's designs, get out your cameras. Most of Mr. Pratt's work is big, commanding, and standing in some public space. One prominent example is the pair of spandrels, "Art and Science" in the archway of our Library of Congress. The term spandrel means the almost triangular space where a square frame meets an arch. Another, more traditional work is "The Genius of Discovery,"



a classic-looking piece of artwork that was part of the 1892 Columbian Exposition. Indeed, the Indian Head gold piece is really Pratt's only foray into coin design.

What collectors are quite familiar with is the incuse design elements of these two coins, meaning that the field is higher than all the design elements, which are sunk into the overall image. References indicate that originally this was not well received with the public. But as time has gone on, the classic beauty of the Native American and the standing eagle has prevailed. Even collectors who cannot spend what is needed for a major date run find that one of these gold pieces can make an excellent type set coin in some bigger assembly.

THE FIRST BURST

The Indian Head quarter-eagle came out of the gate in 1908, and was produced for the most part in pretty good numbers, up until 1915. The rarest piece in that stretch is the 1911-D, from what was then the newly established branch Mint in Denver, the Mile High City.

The amount of precious metal in each of these quarter-eagles is 0.12094 troy ounces, which translates to about \$242, just for that gold. The reality is that virtually all classic United States gold coins are avidly collected in some way, shape or form, and thus cost considerably more than this. Buy-in for the common dates among these \$2.50 gold pieces is about \$500.

Now the Indian Head half-eagle had a run from 1908 to 1916, again with plenty of the mintages being high enough that a modern collector should be able to get one. The rare dates within this group are the 1908-S, the 1909-O, and the 1911-D. Once again the common dates have fairly high numbers attached to them. The winner for most common, by the proverbial country mile, is the 1909-D, with an official tally of 3,423,560. And while a few other dates got close to the one-million mark, only the 1911-S surpassed it. It comes in second for being this common, with 1,416,000 pieces struck.

A second time, we can easily find the value of the gold in these pieces. Each Indian Head half-eagle contains 0.24187 ounces of the yellow metal, making their rock bottom value about \$484 when gold trades at \$2,000 per troy ounce. But one more time the actual price we'll find, at least for the common dates, is going to be significantly higher, about \$750.

THOSE RAISED MINT MARKS

We've just mentioned a few of the mint marked pieces within the Indian Head gold pieces series, but they bear a bit more discussion. As noted, these gold pieces are an entirely incuse design. There has certainly been an incuse design element on several United States coins, both those before and after this design. Usually though, it is simply the word, "Liberty" on the headband of an allegorical figure of



Liberty. In some cases, that incuse "Liberty" becomes one of the markers for how much wear a coin has seen. Here though, because the entire design is incuse, the mint mark becomes something of the odd-man-out, meaning it is the only design feature that rises above the field.

The reason the mint marks rise up off of the field for the Indian Head gold pieces is that they have traditionally been applied with a punch at the branch Mint. The dies were shipped there from Philadelphia, then a mint mark position was selected, and it was punched in. No problem if the entire design is the raised

portion of the planchet. But a bit odd when the field is the raised element. The end result is that when we decide to purchase any of these gold pieces, look carefully at where the mint mark should be. It may be present, but severely worn down from use.

THE FINAL HURRAHS

After years of no production, both denominations of the Indian Head design saw what might be called last hurrahs. For the \$2.50, there was nothing from 1916 to 1924. But there is a 1925-D, then an issue from Philly from 1926 to 1929. Of that crew, the 1925-D is the most common, with 578,000 as its official total. Curiously, it is one of the most common five dates in the entire series.

For the \$5 half-eagle, there is but one year that saw a mintage after 1916, the 1929. Its total is pretty solid, at 662,000 pieces. Not many of these survived the melting pot though, as the cost for one today is eye-poppingly high.

THE PROOFS

In a truly interesting twist, there are some proofs out there for both of these gold pieces. There is no such thing as a proof Indian Head quarter-eagle or half-eagle that is common, or that is cheap. Plenty of the standard reference books and price lists don't even mention them. But the interesting aspect is that these routinely cost less than those 1911-D \$2.50 examples, or 1929 \$5 pieces. Yes, these proofs still cost more than \$10,000 per coin. But this is nowhere near as much as a remarkably rare proof might.

ALL THINGS CONSIDERED?

It might be insane to think we can look at these classic pieces of United States gold coinage and try to assemble something like a date run. But a type set — a duet of one quarter-eagle and one half-eagle? Well, that might just be doable for any of us who choose to wade into these waters.



Peru Books at ½ books, Larry: 1882 5C PCGS PF 63 Shield Nickel, David R: Silver & Copper minted coins w/ value of the intrinsic medal, Jack G: MPC/AMC WWII Replacement Note PMG MS 67 EPQ, Jimmie M: 1800 50C, 1791 Trade \$1, 1800 \$1 (Counterfeits), Mike A: Dallas transit token and fantasy love tokens. Program: "Indian Head or Buffalo Nickels: 1913-1938" by Allan S. James Earl Fraser (1876-1953) was a sculptor and so was his wife Laura Fraser. The designed the Oregon Trail Indian and he designed the obverse Wagon image. The 1913 Type 1 Buffalo is on a mound and the "5 Cents" is raised up. It eventually wears off. It's truly a high relief coin. It's made of Nickel and truly tough to strike as the dies wear out very quickly. High points are the ribbon and hair knot. I see a lot of these that are very flat and avoid those! Be diligent and advise to cherry pick! Type 2 Buffalo Nickels are on a plain and "Five Cents" is recessed. Observe the fur line of the buffalo as it needs to be all the way down. The poor strike on the obverse not enough to make good striking pressure. 1918/7 is also very rare and \$10K in MS 66! The 1937 D 5C is a mistake, as they polished off a leg in error. It's wise to look at the strike details on the 1913 Type I Proof Buffalo Nickels. Example shown was a PF 66+ and almost a completely struck 5C. It's estimated half of the 1913 Proof exist (600). This is due to the preparation of the die as "Artistic" by virtue. The 1914 Type 2 Proof example is PF 67 CAC and a top 10/15 registry. All are considered rare. The 1936 Satin Proof example is well struck. The 1936 Brilliant Proof example is "Shiny" and a Proof 67. Grading services don't account for the strike. Inspect the luster and strike to cherry pick a splendid piece. My advice is always to "buy the book before you buy the coin." Use an allowance and buy the best coin you can afford. When

it comes time to sell you want the buyer to say "I want that coin!" Choose quality over quantity. In 2001, Silver Buffalo Nickels were made by the US Mint as commemoratives. There are also \$50 Gold Mint State Buffalo Coins. It's an amazing sharp strike with details not seen on the smaller 5C Buffalo Nickels. Allen gave another amazing PowerPoint presentation to the Dallas Coin Club and enjoyed by all! Program: "El Cazador" by Frank H. In the beginning of the colonies, England restricted Specie. Americans were looking for Specie and used what they had. Spain was shipping to Mexico and South America. Pirates and stormed preyed on the Spanish ships. The Americans adopted the Spanish Real as their own. Frank's favorite are the 1773-1781 Pillar Dollars. The United States then began making script to match the coins. The Spanish Real was utilized for a very long time! Many movies depict the Gold Spanish Coins. Some cheerleaders use the lingo "1 Bit, 2 Bit, Stand up for a Dollar". In the 1770's the Cazador left New Orleans and owned by Spain. The Script in the United States was not based on Specie and thus devalued. In 1784 the Cazador was loaded in Veracruz, Mexico. Approximately 90 feet and with a 50-man crew. Ship was carrying 700,000 8 Real's, 14-inch Cross with emeralds. An immense storm sunk the ship for 200 years. Napoleon was doing his thing in Europe. His main targets were Haiti, and New Orleans. His army was decimated and lost about 55,000 troops. His dream of taking over the new world ended as he was still fighting England. Jefferson was watching and sent Monroe to buy New Orleans for \$3 Million. He ended up buying much of the interior of the United States for \$15 Million. The Louisiana Purchase doubled the young country. Led to the exploration by Lewis & Clark in 1804 and Manifest Destiny. Two hundred years later Captain Jerry Murphy in the Gulf made a mistake and tore his nets. They ended up finding a bunch of 8 Real coins and started harvesting them. Many were sent to ANACS to encapsulate. It was the "Wreck that changed the World". Many more wrecks/salvage coins aka: "Cash Coins" have since been discovered. Examples include SS Republic, Central America, San Jose, and Portuguese ships. The French, English, Dutch, and Spanish all disliked each other. It was the ship of gold referred by Tommy Thompson. The most important Shipwreck is the Cazador. Spain owned the rights and what would have happened to the United States had it made its destination? What happened with the Coins changed what happened to the United States. Tremendous presentation by Frank and given all by memory! 

explained that die varieties varied, especially in the early years of minting coins in our country. Rob said that each time there is a change in the

die, it is called a Die State and assigned a Die State number. The Die State number refers to the condition of the die while the die is being used to mint coins. Rob explained that sometimes there were cracks in the dies, or wear on the die areas causing different dies states. He said that when he looked at the 1807 Half Cent when it was for sale that it had dentils or denticles around the edges of the coin. Per Rob, this date half cent with dentils is very scarce. Rob said that the reason the dentils were not on later Die States of the 1807 Half Cent is that after a die clash a proactive mint worker worked on cleaning up the dies by grinding them to remove the clash marks, and in the process, removed the dentils. This must have happened early in production in 1807, as most coins do not have the dentils. Rob also passed around an 1866 three cent nickel with clash marks for the members to see. Tony Z talked about the Cherry Pickers Guide and how it can be helpful to identify Die varieties and different Die States in coins. Tony also discussed famous clash coins like the Buggs Bunny Franklin Half Dollar. Tony Z said that the ANA Numismatic Museum in Colorado Springs has a virtual tour available on line to see the rare coins the museum has on display. 


APPLICATION


